Aruba: cultural participation and cultural education in the Caribbean part of the Kingdom of the Netherlands

In 2021, Gregory Richardson mapped out the core data on the cultural infrastructure (arts and heritage) for cultural participation and cultural education in the Caribbean part of the Kingdom of the Netherlands. His study was commissioned by the National Centre of Expertise for Cultural Education and Amateur Arts (LKCA). In this article, we share the information he compiled about Aruba. Together with the European parts of the Netherlands, Aruba and Sint Maarten, Curaçao forms the Kingdom of the Netherlands. The islands of Bonaire, Sint Eustatius and Saba (collectively abbreviated as BES) are special municipalities within the Kingdom. Together they make up the Caribbean Netherlands. These six islands as a whole form the <u>Caribbean part of the Kingdom</u>.

Vision on cultural education

As regards cultural education, the political parties are quite general in their views. The focus is mainly on arts and culture as a means of promoting the overall development of children and youth. In addition, cultural education is seen as playing an important role as part of nation building.

The vision on cultural education is set out in the <u>Policy Document on Culture</u> issued by the Culture Directorate:

The Ministry's vision is driven by the idea that culture is an essential cornerstone for Aruba's social and economic development. This means that, through culture, citizens are able to connect with one another, explore and develop their creativity and, above all, form their identity. A sense of identity is key to cultivating self-esteem and assertiveness. An assertive individual is more likely to seek opportunities that can contribute to the development of a nation.

The Ministry's mission is:

- to contribute to the sustainable development of Aruba's cultural sector through awareness, quality, protection and opportunities.
- to contribute to cultural excellence, so that Aruba's cultural sector will garner respect and admiration for its quality and for being able to deliver experiences that hold qualitative appeal.

Cultural policy plan (core themes for cultural education and participation)

The Policy Document on Culture describes cultural education as 'an essential component' in 'safeguarding culture on Aruba and creating awareness and individual well-being.'

The efforts of the Ministry will focus on including educational components in cultural projects and vice versa where possible. In addition, all departments which have a direct relationship with the Ministry will be encouraged to include cultural education and awareness in their policies. Organisations that cooperate with but are not directly dependent on the government will also be encouraged to do so.
