Together with the European parts of the Netherlands, Aruba and Sint Maarten, Curaçao forms the Kingdom of the Netherlands. The islands of Bonaire, Sint Eustatius and Saba (collectively abbreviated as BES) are special municipalities within the Kingdom. Together they make up the Caribbean Netherlands. These six islands as a whole form the <u>Caribbean part of the Kingdom</u>.

Administrative situation on Curaçao

As regards arts and cultural education, the political parties are quite general in their views on arts and culture as a means of promoting the overall development of children and youth and its importance in nation building.

The Culture and Sport Implementation Organisation (whose responsibilities include cultural education and participation) comes under the Ministry of Education, Science, Culture and Sport (OWCS). The implementation of policy in the culture and sports sector is based on the



Civil Service and Administrative Organisation Decree (LABO), the Business Plan, the coalition agreement and the proposals adopted for these policy areas.

Curaçao Cultural Policy 2020-2025

Cultural policy plan (core themes for cultural education and participation)

The culture domain focuses on developing the cultural awareness and active cultural participation of all Curaçaoans to enable them to achieve balanced personal development. In doing so, culture also gives impetus to nation building and the bringing together of different cultural identities.

Cultural policy vision

The people of Curaçao are culturally aware and patriotic and contribute to nation building by creatively expressing cultural heritage both locally and globally.

Cultural policy goals

- 1 Emancipation
- 2 Fostering greater awareness, especially among younger generations, about the importance of culture for sustainable national development
- 3 Preservation, protection, development, promotion and recreation of cultural heritage
- 4 Promoting cultural education and cultural outreach
- 5 Raising public awareness of the potential of cultural and creative industries for the local economy
- 6 Promoting collective identity and social cohesion by presenting culture as a key factor in bringing people closer together and ensuring mutual exchange and understanding
- 7 Promoting the quality of the arts and culture
- 8 Nurturing the ability to respond to the challenges and opportunities for enriching cultural creativity offered by globalisation



Cultural education

Cultural education requires an integrated approach to education and culture. It should therefore be given a structural place in both the curricular and extracurricular learning and living environment. In practice, this involves not only acquiring knowledge about culture, but also promoting skills such as observation, imagination, conceptualisation and analysis. This supports the learner in the learning process. In the process, learners are empowered to shape their own lives and develop creative and inquisitive attitudes.

Vision

The vision of the Culture and Sport Implementation Organisation (UCS) is derived from the vision of the Ministry of Education, Science, Culture and Sport and reads as follows:

'Increasing activities for personal development in both formal and non-formal sectors for the benefit of the population by making use of the policy fields of Culture and Sport. The intended result is to further the development of the ideal citizen of the country of Curaçao and the world. These two policy fields create a rich opportunity for residents to realise their potential on the basis of norms and values, and to participate in processes geared towards awareness and the acquisition of knowledge about the past, present and future. UCS aims to further the development towards becoming an ideal citizen, with an emphasis on disadvantaged citizens. The target group for stimulating the relevant competences includes all ages, from birth to 100 years old.'

Mission statement

Issuing subsidies, monitoring and control for the purpose of achieving cultural development, including non-formal education, education and increased participation in sports among the population.

The mission of the sector for the coming period is based on efficiency and effectiveness. Using the instruments at its disposal, the sector is working to achieve greater transparency through relationship management in the form of dialogue with its partners. By intensifying supervision and control, the sector aims to strengthen effectiveness in the field of culture and sport.

Objectives

The strategy envisaged is:

- 1 to cooperate more closely with the policy organisation in drawing up the programme of requirements, analysing the societal effects of activities and formulating policy papers and plans of action for the various challenges in the fields of culture and sport (relevant themes include community schooling, neighbourhood development and active participation in policy making);
- 2 to cooperate with the Education and Science Implementation Organisation to achieve more effective and efficient implementation with regard to culture and sport and to boost the impact of activities, with a view to pursuing the following objectives:
 - a implementing a culture and sports curriculum in education;
 - b complementing the personal development and education of the school-age population;
- 3 to analyse products with a view to reaching conclusions on and initiating cooperation between ministries (relevant themes include pre-school education and after-school care);
- 4 to motivate foundations to cooperate with one another.
