Sint Maarten: cultural participation and cultural education in the Caribbean part of the Kingdom of the Netherlands

In 2021, Gregory Richardson mapped out the core data on the cultural infrastructure (arts and heritage) for cultural participation and cultural education in the Caribbean part of the Kingdom of the Netherlands. His study was commissioned by the National Centre of Expertise for Cultural Education and Amateur Arts (LKCA). In this article, we share the information he compiled about Sint Maarten. Together with the European parts of the Netherlands, Aruba and Sint Maarten, Curaçao forms the Kingdom of the Netherlands. The islands of Bonaire, Sint Eustatius and Saba (collectively abbreviated as BES) are special municipalities within the Kingdom. Together they make up the Caribbean Netherlands. These six islands as a whole form the <u>Caribbean part of the Kingdom</u>.



1 Key population data

The island of Saint Martin is divided into a Dutch and a French territory. The French part – the Collectivité de Saint-Martin – is French-speaking, somewhat larger in terms of land surface and has a slightly smaller population. The data below apply to the Dutch part of the island: Sint Maarten.

2 Cultural policy

Cultural policy plan (core themes for cultural education and participation)

5 Funds and funding bodies

The Sint Maarten Development Fund (SMDF)

SMDF is a legal entity on Sint Maarten that actively works to improve the lives of the most vulnerable members of Sint Maarten society. The Fund was established to further the country's social development. Whether through foster homes, emergency shelters, seniors enrichment programmes, after-school activities or food pantries, SMDF works to support foundations that support the people of Sint Maarten.

Resilience Resources 4 Community Resilience (R4CR)

This programme, implemented by VNG International and funded by the World Bank Trust Fund for Sint Maarten, was created to help the island in the devastating aftermath of Hurricane Irma in 2017. It covers the following categories and sectors:

Voice of the Youth Sint Maarten

Our Sint Maarten Youth Brigade offers a three-year programme for our target group aged 12-21. We seek to eradicate negative behaviour among our young people and to help them develop and achieve a general sense of well-being. We provide them with physical, mental, cognitive and social education to promote self-confidence, self-esteem and higher-order thinking skills.

SXM A.C.T.I.O.N

Our mission is to provide development opportunities that empower young people aged 18 to 40 to bring about positive changes, both individually and in the community as a whole.

Sint Maarten Senior Citizens Recreational Foundation

The leisure centre in Hope Estate provides an opportunity for senior citizens to socialise regularly with people their own age. Festive meals are organised on public holidays and other special days to encourage interaction among older members of the community.
