Overview of funds and funding bodies

Cultural sector support package

Cultural institutions facing financial difficulties as a result of the Covid pandemic are eligible for assistance under the terms of the Government Emergency Package. The public entities of Bonaire, Sint Eustatius and Saba are responsible for how these resources are put to use, as is the case with municipalities in the European Netherlands.

The Ministry of Education, Culture and Science <u>has informed</u> the public entities that it is prepared to provide support in this regard, should it be desired. In the European Netherlands, budgets from the second support package have also been released for deployment through existing avenues, such as schemes for creators through the national cultural funds. The schemes from the support package managed by the national cultural funds are also open to applicants in the Caribbean Netherlands and, in some cases, the other countries in the Kingdom. National cultural funds

The six national cultural funds have launched a partnership with the Prince Bernhard Cultural Fund for the Caribbean Region (PBCCG). The aim of this partnership is to jointly explore ways to increase accessibility and outreach for applicants in the Caribbean part of the Kingdom.

During a nine-month pilot period, the PBCCG will serve as an additional point of contact for cultural creatives in the Caribbean Netherlands. An information desk was opened on 1 January 2022 to raise awareness among local applicants of the grant opportunities available from the national cultural funds and to help lower the thresholds for applicants. The information desk can also pass on any signals to the funds and highlight needs that they observe in the cultural field.

In the 2021-2024 policy framework, the schemes managed by the funds have also been made available to the three countries of Curaçao, Aruba and Sint Maarten within the Kingdom, insofar as this reflects the schemes' objectives.

1 Performing Arts Fund NL

Performing Arts Fund NL is the cultural fund for music, musical theatre, dance, theatre and festivals in the Netherlands. The Fund provides support to all forms of the professional



performing arts on behalf of the government and is also open to applications from the islands of the Caribbean Netherlands. In fulfilling its role, Performing Arts Fund NL is primarily concerned with quality in the broadest sense of the word.

In addition to grants spanning several years, the Fund offers a number of programming and production grants, as well as individual grants. Particular attention is paid to internationalisation and pluralism with regard to companies, venues and audiences. The Fund also places a strong emphasis on cultural diversity in its broadest possible sense. Encouraging innovation in the chain of creation, production, distribution and consumption is an area of special focus for the Fund.

Other funds

Prince Bernhard Cultural Fund for the Caribbean Region (PBCCG).

The Prince Bernhard Cultural Fund for the Caribbean Region is a private, independent foundation which aims to promote activities in the fields of history, literature, the visual arts, music, dance, theatre, arts and cultural education, heritage and nature conservation on Curaçao, Aruba, Sint Maarten, Bonaire, Sint Eustatius and Saba. Culture in the Caribbean part of the Kingdom Ratification of the 2001 UNESCO Convention on the Protection of the Underwater Cultural Heritage

On the issue of the ratification of the 2001 UNESCO Convention on the Protection of Underwater Cultural Heritage, a decision was taken at the November 2019 four-country ministerial consultation that efforts should be made to ratify and implement the Convention simultaneously throughout the Kingdom. To this end, two working groups coordinated by the Netherlands were set up for cooperation and knowledge sharing with a view to achieving this aim.

These working groups – once focusing on the field and the other on policy – are now up and running with representation from the six islands. The working group focusing on the field is working towards a joint awareness programme and pushing for improvements in maritime heritage management in preparation for the Convention's implementation. Meanwhile, the policy working group has initiated an analysis to produce an overview of the legislative and regulatory changes.
